Access to Justice Index as Evidence for Policy Reform

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Background

Up until 2019, there are no comprehensive and updated monitoring tools or ideal definitions of access to justice condition in Indonesia

Government administrative data is not integrated and comprehensive

Meanwhile, access to justice is one of the goals in SDGs (Goal 16.3)



Before measuring access to justice

- Conduct preliminary research by desk research and series of formal/informal discussion with government, CSO also development partners
- Involving legal need survey experts to emphasizing people-centered data sources
- Intensive informal



Strategies

Formal/informal discussions to continuously ensure that :

- Quantitative data is also important as an evidence
- A2J Index as achievement to be reported in SDGs VNR or international forum
- A2J Index as modality and evidence for government to prove their work
- A2J Index as reference for government's planning and budgeting process

High willingness of the government champions to:

- Show the achievements of A2J in Indonesia to the national and global forum
- Put the A2J Index into government's workplan
- Build the network with global development partners to gather resources
- Involving other rep of government to join the global network

- Access to Justice Index as one of the targets in National Midterm Plan 2020-2024 in Law & Regulation Transformation Aspects
- A2J Index as mandatory data in SDGs 16.3 reporting
- A2J Index was used as reference for the government to endorse SDGs 16.3.3
- A2J Index as reference for government to improve their administrative data
